

His teaching includes the course 'Defining California: From Bierce's The Devil's Dictionary to Wikipedia."



Who-kulele? You-kulele!

Library patrons of every age will soon be offered the opportunity to learn to play the ukulele.

A small four-stringed instrument, the ukulele originated in Portugal. It was patented in Hawaii in 1917 and derives its name from the Hawaiian word for "leaping flea."

Whittier Public Library is using funds from a \$10,000 grant it received from the California State Library to purchase the ukuleles, as well as books (both print and digital), CDs, and DVDs to add to our collections.

The Library has hired the Lee Sisters to provide instruction on the instrument and give performances. The ukulele series begins in May, and more information about it will become available soon.
